ANILA QUAYYUM AGHA: ILLUMINATIONS

OCTOBER 26, 2023 - APRIL 28, 2024

William L. & Bette Batchelor Gallery and Alix W. Stanley Gallery



This October ushers in a dazzling, immersive NEW/ NOW exhibition featuring the work of Anila Quayyum Agha (b. 1965), an internationally celebrated artist who explores the complexities and contradictions of her experience as a Pakistani immigrant to the United States through monumental installations and intimate paintings and drawings. This exhibition features her iconic light sculpture Intersections in concert with new paintings and works on paper.

Throughout her career, Agha has treated light and shadow as subjects that reference Islamic art and architecture and interrogate prescribed gender roles, ideas of home and belonging, and the intersections of identity and culture. Agha's large-scale cube installations cast light and shadow across architectural spaces to immerse viewers in shared and inclusive experiences. The patterns Agha laser cuts into the lacquered-steel cubes are a reinterpretation of floral and geometric motifs found in Islamic art and architecture in Asia and Africa. Suspended and lit from within, the cubes cast elaborate floor-to-ceiling shadows that transform the surrounding environment, alluding to the richly ornamented public spaces such as mosques that Agha was excluded from as a female growing up in Lahore.

In addition to her suspended installations, Agha creates wall-mounted two-dimensional works that play with light, shadow, and pattern. Her recent work includes resin paintings in which Agha radically expands her

use of color and explores pattern in new ways. She departs from her characteristic streamlined palettes in favor of vivid hues inspired by the high-contrast color combinations popular in South Asian and African textiles.

Since 2019, her work has been featured in thirteen solo museum exhibitions worldwide. Agha received a BFA from the National College of Arts, Lahore, and an MFA from the University of North Texas. She resides in Indianapolis, Indiana, and Augusta, Georgia, where she is a professor and the Eminent Morris Scholar of Fine Art at Augusta University. Major awards include the 2019 Painters and Sculptors Grant from the Joan Mitchell Foundation and the 2021 SARF (Smithsonian Artist Research Fellowship). In 2019, Agha's work was included in She Persists at the Venice Biennale.


ARTIST STATEMENT

Having lived on the boundaries of different faiths such as Islam and Christianity, and in cultures like Pakistan and the USA, my art is deeply influenced by the simultaneous sense of alienation and transience that informs the migrant experience. This consciousness of knowing what is markedly different about the human experience also bears the gift of knowing its core commonalities and it is these tensions and contradictions that I try to embody in my artwork. Through the use of a variety of media, from large sculptural installations to embroidered drawings I explore the deeply entwined political relationships between gender, culture, religion, labor and social codes. In my work I have used combinations of textile processes such as embroidery, wax, dyes, and silk-screen printing along with sculptural methodologies to reveal and question the gendering of textile work as inherently domesticated and excluded from being considered an art form. My experiences in my native country and as an immigrant here in the United States are woven into my work of redefining and rewriting women's handiwork as a poignant form of creative expression. Using embroidery as a drawing medium I reveal the multiple layers resulting from the interaction of concept and process and to bridge the gap between modern materials and historical patterns of traditional oppression and domestic servitude. The conceptual ambiguity of the resulting patterns, create an interactive experience in which the onlooker's subjective experiences of alienation and belonging become part of the piece and its identity.



WOMEN REFRAME AMERICAN LANDSCAPE

Illuminating the artistic contributions and perspectives of women, this two-part exhibition includes the first retrospective of the nineteenth-century American artist Susie M. Barstow (1836-1923) and a presentation of contemporary works by artists Teresita Fernández, Guerrilla Girls, Marie Lorenz, Tanya Marcuse, Mary Mattingly, Ebony G. Patterson, Anna Plesset, Wendy Red Star, Jean Shin, Jaune Quick-to-See Smith, Cecilia Vicuña, Kay WalkingStick, and Saya Woolfalk. Engaging multigenerational perspectives, this exhibition recenters women in the canon of American art and expands how we think about land and landscape.

The nineteenth-century portion of this two-part exhibition includes the first ever solo exhibition and deep dive into the life and work of artist Susie M. Barstow (1836-1923), who exhibited and sold work alongside Hudson River School icons such as Albert Bierstadt, Frederic Church, and Asher Brown Durand, but has received little scholarly attention until now. A prolific and important artist in her day, major works by Barstow are on view, along with the artist's sketches and materials and a selection of works by artists in her circle, including Julie Hart Beers, Fidelia Bridges, Charlotte Buell Coman, Eliza Greatorex, Mary Josephine Walters, and Laura Woodward.

In conversation with Barstow and her nineteenth-century circle, the exhibition features works by thirteen internationallyacclaimed artists, who draw upon diverse processes and perspectives to complicate and rethink our relationship to land and landscape today. Responding to and at times challenging historical narratives, many of the artists created unique, siteresponsive installations for this exhibition.

Organized by the Thomas Cole National Historic Site in partnership with the New Britain Museum of American Art, this is one initiative among many to continually see landscape art in the United States as dynamic, multifaceted, and evolving. The exhibition is curated by Dr. Nancy Siegel, Professor of Art History at Towson University; Kate Menconeri, Chief Curator and Director of Curatorial Affairs, Contemporary Art, and Fellowship at the Thomas Cole National Historic Site, and Amanda Malmstrom, Associate Curator at the Thomas Cole National Historic Site. It is accompanied by a fully-illustrated catalogue published by Hirmer that includes essays by the curators, a conversation between Candice Hopkins and Jolene Rickard, texts and plates by the artists, and a timeline on women, land, and art. Additionally, the exhibition coincides with the first monograph on Susie M. Barstow authored by Nancy Siegel.

MASTERWORKS OF SHAKER DESIGN: MOUNT LEBANON, NY

In 2023, the NBMAA launched a new exhibition series entitled *Masterworks of Shaker Design*, the first of which was titled *The Tale of Two Enfields*. Currently on view, the second exhibition in the series is devoted to the community of Mount Lebanon, New York. This was the first Shaker community to be "gathered into order." As such, this was the first fully organized village dedicated to the principles of Shakerism: confession of sins (in private, to an elder or eldress), communal ownership of all goods and property, and celibacy. In addition, the full equality of men and women, acceptance of all races and creeds, and pacificism were foundational tenets.

In 1774, a small band of Believers who dissented from the established Church of England sailed from England to New York City, in the English colony of New York. They were led by an illiterate, but charismatic woman named Ann Lee; later called "Mother Ann." Within a few years, the group established a foothold in a swampy area near Schenectady, New York, called Niskeyuna (later, Watervliet). They began proselytizing from this modest base and, by the mid-1780s, more than one hundred converts committed to their gospel message. Soon after, several adjacent farms in the area of the town called New Lebanon, New York, were consolidated into a single site. In 1787, this became the Shaker Community of New Lebanon.

NOW THROUGH MARCH 3, 2024

From the start, and until the mid-20th Century, New (Mount) Lebanon was the seat of authority, sometimes referred to as the Central Ministry, for the entire movement. The Shaker Society eventually included eighteen long-lasting villages, stretching from Maine to Kentucky. This leadership role is a second reason for selecting New Lebanon as the focus for this exhibition. Finally, as a result of its size, at one time housing more than 600 members, and its relatively late date of closure, 1947, more artifacts have survived from here than from any other Shaker village.

The overarching goal of this series at the NBMAA is to bring to our visitors examples of the finest objects of Shaker design and craftsmanship. The NBMAA is grateful to the following lenders to this exhibition: Martin Kline, Darlene and George Kohrman, Dr. Don G. Wartella, John Keith Russell, and one private collector. We extend a special thank you to the Shaker Museum, Chatham, New York, Lacy Schutz, Executive Director, and Jerry Grant, Director of Collections and Research. A graduate of Cornell University, Stephanie earned her MA in art history from the University of Chicago and her PhD in art history from Boston University. She served as the Margaret and Terry Stent Curator of American Art at the High Museum since 2009, overseeing a collection program spanning over 200 years of historic paintings, drawings, prints and sculpture. With her academic specialization in nineteenth-century paintings, prints, and popular culture, Stephanie expanded her areas of interest to address the full scope of the High's diverse American collection.



Before coming to the High, Stephanie held positions at the Gulf Coast Museum of Art, Harvard University Art Museums, and the Terra Museum of American Art (now the Terra Foundation for American Art), in addition to fellowships. In addition to her scholarship for the High Museum, she has contributed to several publications for institutions, including Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, the Harvard University Art Museums, the Terra Foundation for American Art, and the Smithsonian American Art Museum. Over the course of her career. Stephanie has also demonstrated her commitment to serving the museum profession and training the next generation of curators.

I IN MEMORIAM



Christine Shivery (1948 - 2023)

"Her glass was always half full," "she raised the fun factor," "she was fun-loving, warm and generous"—these are just some of the ways her friends and colleagues at the NBMAA remember Christine Shivery. Add to that "dedicated Trustee," "loyal Museum member," and "generous patron," Chris was the epitome of the NBMAA supporter. Chris died Wednesday, June 14, 2023, at her home in Florida.

As a Trustee from 2008 to 2018, Chris was very active, serving on numerous committees including the Executive, Acquisition and Loan (now Collections), Development, and Nominating Committees. On the Collections Committee, as a talented artist in her own right, she was particularly effective in reviewing proposed works for the permanent collection and outgoing loans.

It was in the development arena that her natural abilities particularly shone—as a team builder, fundraiser, and friend-raiser. She co-chaired the gala, The Art Party of the Year, not once but twice with Margaret Lawson and Susan Rathgeber in 2009 and 2010, raising a net \$389,000 from those two signature events. With her husband Chuck, Chris hosted gala tables year after year. She donated her artwork to the gala art auctions, recruited friends and acquaintances to work on the gala and spearheaded the first Artists Party, a special event to thank the many artists that contributed to the gala's success.

Chris and Chuck contributed to the Museum generously and in many ways. As consistent major donors, the Shiverys not only maintained the Museum's highest Membership level in the John Butler Talcott Society throughout Chris's board tenure, they supported many special Museum projects. This included a major gift, in combination with a gift from Northeast Utilities of which Chuck was Chairman, President and CEO, during the 2015 \$21 million campaign that created the Shivery Gallery, which houses the Museum's prized and ever-popular Impressionist works.

Chris was enthusiastically designated Trustee Emeritus status in October 18, 2017, after ten years of exceptional Board service.

We mourn her loss and celebrate the incredible impact she made at our Museum and in our community.

MOVER AND SHAKER SPOTLIGHT

I had been retired from teaching English in high school for six years when I joined the Docent class of 2013. I missed teaching; I especially missed my students and colleagues and our discussions about literature and writing. The classroom was a place for discovery and understanding. When a friend who had been a Docent for several years suggested I might enjoy preparing and giving tours to students and adults at the NBMAA, I applied to the Docent program. I didn't realize at the time how meaningful and important these past ten years would be.

Having taught American Literature and American Studies for years, I now guide students and adults through the Museum galleries to explore the way American art helps in our understanding of the complexities and challenges of American history and identity. Discussions now focus on the ways artists use visual imagery to tell the many diverse stories of American life. Each painting, each sculpture, each photograph enables us to enter a new world. The building itself is such a beautiful and intimate space; it provides the perfect setting to share with others our discoveries.

My favorite artwork is Robert Henri's An Imaginative Boy. Every time I see this bright and vivid painting of a little boy, I smile and remember exactly why I love being a Docent. Henri captures this child's innocence, the sparkle in his

eyes, the sense that he can barely contain his exuberance a moment longer, yet he sits patiently, smiling at the artist and at us. I wonder what he is imagining, but whatever it is he seems delighted. This painting reminds me of how many children come to the Museum on tours to experience and learn about art in the galleries and to have fun creating their own artworks in the studios. Their eyes often sparkle, too, as they explore the artworks and create from their own imaginations. We all need to find places where we can experience delight and wonder. The NBMAA has become that place for me and so many others.

I am also grateful to the Museum for giving me the opportunity to create talks that have become a series entitled "Artists and Writers." In these hour-long talks in the galleries, I link artists with the writers who were their contemporaries and draw parallels between the visual artistic imagery and the written imagery and themes from passages of novels, speeches, and poems. Since the first talk I created in 2017, I have focused on the special exhibitions, linking Kara Walker with Frederick Douglass and Toni Morrison, Georgia O'Keeffe with Willa Cather and Wallace Stevens, Maurice Prendergast with F. Scott Fitzgerald and Edna St. Vincent Millay, and the American Transcendentalists with the artists in the Poetry of Nature exhibition in the spring of 2022.

For the exhibition Women Reframe American Landscape opening at the end of November, I will link Susie Barstow and other women painters from the Hudson River School with the nineteenth-century writers Harriet Beecher Stowe, Harriet Jacobs, and Emily Dickinson-drawing parallels with their imagery and perception of nature, as well as the courage, perseverance, and independent spirit these artists and writers showed throughout their lives. The talk will be offered on Wednesdays, December 6, January 10, February 7, and March 13. I look forward to once again sharing my love of art and literature with visitors to the Museum.
